MIA, Castlebar NYP, Foróige, No Name Club, Youth Information Centre, Mayo County Library, MTSG and Louisburgh CDP, there were drumming, hip hop and art workshops and a chance for young people of different nationalities and cultures to stand up and let the world know what it’s like for them to be young and living in Mayo. The energy and optimism generated that afternoon could have powered the national grid.

MIA Celebrates Africa Day



‘It reminds me of when I lived in Africa. I love being among African people. They really know how to celebrate.’

That was how one local participant summed up the Food Fair, song and dance organised in MIA’s offices to celebrate Africa Day on Saturday 24th May.

A huge crowd sampled food from Ghana, Nigeria, Ivory Coast, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Algeria, Morocco, South Africa, Egypt and Zimbabwe.

The MIA Intercultural Singing Group performed and generated such energy that everyone joined in the singing and dancing.

The event was part funded by the Irish Government through Irish Aid. A big thanks to Castlebar Fair Trade Group for their contribution on the day.

Naisc Nua was set up in 2006 to help people living in Mayo who have refugee status or who have been granted leave to remain in the country, including the parents of Irish-born children, to achieve meaningful integration in the life of the County through training and employment. This is a joint initiative with Meitheal Mhaigheo, funded through Pobal under the Dormant Accounts scheme.

Naisc Nua contributes to Community Platform

Mayo Community Platform is made up of 12 community development organisations in County Mayo that come together to address social inclusion and anti-poverty issues. The group meets every second month in the MIA offices. Naisc Nua/MIA is one of three members of the strategic planning/steering group which was involved in setting up this platform.

Barriers to integration and to accessing education, training and employment are key priorities of this group. Naisc Nua has given a presentation on these issues and continues to give regular updates and inputs concerning refugees and people with residency or leave to remain. It also identifies models of good practice in relation to these target groups so that each organisation can replicate and implement programmes in their geographical area. The platform also made an in-depth joint submission to Mayo CDB for the Local Anti-Poverty and Social Inclusion Strategies (LAPSSIS) which is currently in process.

NAISC NUA/MIA AND THE MAYO FORUM FOR IMMIGRANT LIAISON COMMUNITIES

This forum is coordinated by the County Development Board (CDB) and brings together a wide range of regional and local agencies, community groups and immigrant representatives. Its aim is to promote and facilitate successful integration of immigrant communities in the County. One of MIA's recommendations in its research document *Building a Diverse Mayo; a report of immigration, integration and service provision (2006)* was to establish such a forum.

As well as sitting on the steering group, Naisc Nua and MIA are also represented on each of the forum's working sub groups. These are: employment and training; intercultural activities; education; information and service provision; health and accommodation.

Naisc Nua/MIA's coordinator, Thérèse Ruane, chairs the training and employment sub group. Through this subgroup, Naisc Nua is putting in place a programme of activities: information evenings and seminars on employment rights,

education and training opportunities in the County and specific training programmes for ethnic minorities. All these events are organised in partnership with relevant organisations and are advertised in the local press as well as through MIA's mailing list.

In addition to its driving role in the Mayo Forum for Immigrant Liaison Communities, Naisc Nua and MIA are represented on other regional bodies such as the Social Inclusion Measures Working Group of Mayo CDB and Mayo Citizen Information Services. Nationally, Naisc Nua and MIA are represented on the Western Alliance of Refugee Support Groups and Integrating Ireland and makes regular presentations at local, regional and national level at conferences organised by, for example, NCCRI, Pobal, Amnesty International and Sonas mainstreaming group.

Naisc Nua and MIA are constantly developing and strengthening links with an extensive range of other relevant organisations.

Leadership Training

Naisc Nua/MIA organised three days' leadership training for Support Group members in Ballyhaunis and Kiltimagh, facilitated by Noirin Clancy. Training was also provided on the issue of domestic violence by Akidwa, the Dublin-based African women's network which was set up in 2001 to promote equality for African women living in Ireland. Akidwa will be delivering training for men around gender violence in the near future.

Information Evening: IRP Bill



Continuing a series of information nights hosted by Naisc Nua/MIA, in January Aki Stravrou, director of Integrating Ireland, spoke about the government's proposed

Immigration, Residence and Protection Bill. Previous information nights have included talks on the situation in Palestine and the plight of the Karen people in Burma.

The meeting was called to make people aware of the implications of the proposed Bill for asylum seekers, refugees, migrant workers and their families, as well as for Irish nationals. It aimed to give an overview of the content of the Bill, including such vital areas as long-term residency, access to protection, the right to marry, family reunification, undocumented workers

and the highly criticised detention of asylum seekers or undocumented migrants.

More than 60 people came to the MIA offices to hear Aki Stravros pinpoint those sections of the Bill which, in his opinion, represent the greatest threat to the rights and freedoms of immigrants to Ireland. He encouraged everyone present to lobby local and national representatives to ensure that essential amendments were made before the Bill passed into law.

In his concluding remarks Mr Stravrou said: "Immigration and integration are among the biggest issues facing Ireland today and nobody should want this to be an opportunity lost by the Government to establish a workable, fair and forward-looking immigration and protection system."

The Bill is before the Dáil at the moment.

Jobs Club



Following the success of the Jobs Club held last January, another was run in June in the Naisc Nua/MIA offices. The Jobs Club is facilitated by Jackie Brennan from Meitheal Mhaigheo and took place from 10 am to 1 pm, Monday to Friday, over a period of three weeks.

The Jobs Club is a unique opportunity for people to gain skills and expertise in CV preparation, interview skills and how to go about looking for a job. It greatly benefits people coming from other countries, helping them to gain insight into the jobs market and to understand how things work in Ireland.
